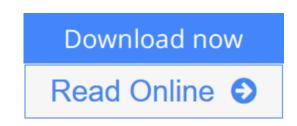

The popularity and pervasiveness of film and television in 21st-century life is inescapable. Whether viewed as entertainment, educational, or cultural forms, the effect of these media on our lifestyles and attitudes is unmistakable. No wonder an increasing number of academics, students, and laypeople are drawn to study their particular appeal. Mark Emmons's magnum opus is a true labor of love. International in scope, it offers 1,244 substantially annotated entries, organized by topic. Its focus is movies and television shows: how they are produced; the people who make and appear in them; their content, their distribution and exhibition; and their reception by audiences, reviewers, critics, and scholars. Beginning with general guides, dictionaries and encyclopedias, the book then turns to filmographies, filmmakers, and filmmaking respectively. Filmographies lists films and television shows in the categories of national cinema and genre, made by studios or filmmakers, or featuring various groups of people. Filmmakers includes biographies and credits for filmmakers and actors. Filmmaking includes reference sources on making film and television shows. An indispensable guide for librarians, faculty, students, neophyte filmmakers, and fans everywhere.

Movies and television are fascinating subjects, but it is difficult to find information about them in one place. That need is met by this guide, which is an annotated and comprehensive list of print and electronic sources. As stated in the introduction, the guide is intended as a starting point for researchers and complements a similar work in the Reference Sources in the Humanities series on journalism and mass communication. It covers film and television from the earliest days to 2004 for print and 2005 for Web sites. Author Emmons was inspired by Kim Fisher's On the Screen: A Film, Television, and *Video Research Guide* (Libraries Unlimited, 1986).

The guide is arranged in 14 chapters covering types of resources, such as "Indexes and Bibliographies," or topics, such as "Fans and Audience." Each chapter has a number of subdivisions. For example, chapter 6, "Genres," has sections on categories ranging from game shows to war films. The entries are numbered consecutively from 1 to 1,244, and each includes a citation to the print source or Web site, followed by a paragraph-long annotation. The annotations are both descriptive and critical. Six appendixes cover Library of Congress and Dewey decimal subject headings and classifications. Two indexes, one of authors and titles and one of subjects, complete the work.

The only section that has some definite omissions is "Worst," in chapter 4 ("General Film and Television Filmographies"), which fails to include Michael Medved's books, *The Golden Turkey Awards* (1980) or *The Hollywood Hall of Shame* (1984). Also missing is Roger Ebert's *I Hated, Hated, Hated This Movie* (2000). Even so, the volume is valuable to film and television enthusiasts and an excellent collection development guide. "Emmons's passion for the large and small screen is evident in this annotated bibliography of reference sources, for which he personally examined and described over 1,200 resources. Recognizing that movies and television are now legitimate areas of growing scholarly analysis, his work identifies print titles (exhaustively) and free and subscription Web sites (selectively). Beyond the standard bibliographies, encyclopedias, and even filmographies, works are organized by topic....Emmons reluctantly limits himself to English-language publications (but spends 46 pages on worldwide cinema) and excludes journalism, individuals and individual works, memorabilia, and trivia. Brief explanatory topic introductions precede carefully done, insightful source annotations that speak to quality, currency, and uniqueness. Appendixes provide bonuses: recommended LC subject headings; LC Moving Image Genre/Form List; a breakdown of LC classification PN1900 by subject, then by classification number, followed by similar information for Dewey.
